

Serving a diverse ESL student population with varying educational backgrounds and skill levels, the Mission campus of San Francisco City College found that SANAKO Lab 100 catered fully to the needs of all its learners.

City College of San Francisco, Mission Campus

Mission Campus is one of the neighborhood campuses of City College of San Francisco. These campuses are located throughout the city and serve different populations of students. The population served by Mission Campus is largely Hispanic and Chinese. The primary goal on the campuses is to serve the immigrant community and give students an opportunity to learn English as A Second Language from literacy and/or beginning level through to high intermediate courses. Although the program is primarily non-credit, the College encourages students to enroll in the credit program as their English level improves to the point where they can take on the demands of regular college courses. Mission campus has approximately 64 teachers in both daytime and evening classes. It serves a population of around 3,000 students. In addition to ESL classes, there are 15 computer classes. The students have varied education backgrounds, all the way from one or two years of school in their native countries to advanced degrees.

The SANAKO Lab 100 classes run by John Robinson serve largely intermediate and high beginner level students. The curriculum consists of a number of very useful audio material all of which have been transferred from tape to the Media Storage Unit (MSU). Mr. Robinson uses dialogue practices which he wrote himself. These are called "Dialogue Workout" and "Grammartalk". Dialogue Workout focuses on conversations arising out of real life situations such as banking, shopping, using transportation, and asking questions. Grammartalk stresses conversations that reflect particular grammar patterns such as simple past, future, present perfect, and passive voice.

Teaching English to Non-native Speakers

He also uses the well-designed ESL texts and workbooks of Mr. William Bliss and Mr. Molinsky entitled "Side by Side." This text has conversation and listening exercises on CD's which are easily copied to the MSU. The sound is very clear and high quality and the conversation practices are sprinkled with sound effects that are non intrusive and that add interest and color to the exercises.

Classes also use the Edoon Reading Comprehension Workbook series. Mr. Robinson has recorded the stories and articles, and the students listen while reading. Then, they answer comprehension questions.

Finally, students engage in numerous pronunciation exercises whereby they focus on a given pronunciation problem while at the same time learning vocabulary. The teacher might for example list twenty-five words beginning with the sound /r/ and let students find which word fits best in chosen blanks within sentences. Additionally, Lab 100 has such fine sound quality that music presentations work very well. Lyrics to popular songs can be downloaded to teach vocabulary and meaning, and the students can hear the songs as part of a listening activity. DVD's and videos work very well as students can hear sound tracks very clearly through their headsets.

Resources and Activities for Effective Language Teaching

The audio materials are very well suited to the resilient and versatile set of tools that Lab 100 supplies. The three session design allows teachers

to accommodate those slower students who may need more remediation than the others.

Also, the teacher can send more advanced materials to faster-paced students. Lab 100 allows teachers to accommodate multi-level classes, and that is precisely what a standard ESL class is. "Typically, for any conversation-based lesson, I will first present the content and explain it. When I'm sure the students understand the vocabulary and grammar of the exercise, I will give them the opportunity to either repeat the dialogue or complete question and answer," explains Mr. Robinson.

Using Lab 100's Model Imitation Activity, the students will speak and record their voices. This activity will usually last between five and ten minutes. But the time used is extremely efficient. Students are very engaged knowing their voices are being recorded. After students have recorded their voices, placing the desk recorders in "Free Mode" allows learners to listen to themselves simply by pressing the green button. The teacher can click on "Recorder Status" to check if all students have their recorders turned on. If anyone isn't following the instructions, the teacher can turn their recorder on for them from the desktop. They can

then use the "Add/Remove" tab to turn off any unused seats, preparing the class for "Pair Discussion."

Essential Support for Students

This still leaves time to monitor their individual positions, checking and if necessary correcting their pronunciation and/or grammar. Finally, they can be paired randomly to commence the "Pair Discussion" activity that allows each one to practice with another student in the class. The two numbers on their recorders tell them who their partner is because one number is their own position and the other is their partner's. Students really enjoy this very social yet practical chance to engage in conversation.

The ESL teacher has also found that listening exams are especially helpful. In one case, he reads a short story without an ending, and students must decide the best ending for the selection by choosing sentence a, b, c, or d.

Having only used Lab 100 for three semesters, John Robinson feels that he is still at the beginning of a marvelous teaching adventure. Lab 100's simple yet varied structure is giving him the chance of a lifetime to teach ESL in a way that maximizes the students' time and gives them a full plate of exercises and experiences on a daily basis. "I'm very pleased with the very simple way I can select an exercise for my students through the MSU's easily accessible menu. Gone are the days when I had to search for the right tape in a rack. Now, I can vary each class in a way I was never able to do previously," he adds. Robinson says his only fear is that the classes using Lab 100 will become so popular, students will have to be turned away.
